



Writing Contests

Writing contests are a great way to get established in the literary community. They're also a good way to hone your writing skills and earn money. Fortunately, there are literally hundreds of writing contests offered throughout the year in every genre. Some are local, while others are national or even international.

One benefit of winning a contest is that your piece usually receives an offer for publication. Typically, a magazine publishes your piece or a publishing company offers you a contract, usually from a small press.

A word of caution: if there is an entry fee, check out the organization to make sure it is a legitimate contest before sending any money. There are several scams out there posing as legitimate contests.

Here are a few sites I have found useful:

[Reedsy Ultimate List of Contests 2024](#) has assembled a gigantic list of available contests from around the world. Although this is an excellent source for finding contests, it is important to go to each contest website to see the submission guidelines. Some contests specifically target writers under 18 or restrict submissions to certain geographic areas, such as Florida residents only. With a little work, you can find the perfect contest(s) for you.



40 Free Writing Contests: Competitions with Cash Prizes – Sponsored by “The Write Life.”

What I like about this site is that all the contests listed are free to enter but offer cash prizes to the winners. The site's disadvantage is that it only lists 40 contests, so it doesn't represent every genre.

Poets & Writers Contests, Grants, and Awards

This is the best site I have found for entering poetry contests. For those of us who enjoy writing poetry, it can be difficult to find a market for our work. A good place to start is entering contests for poets offered by those who enjoy reading poetry.

Almond Press–Writing Competitions, Updated Weekly

This site organizes writing contests by their deadline date. As you organize your contest submissions, it's good to have a site that allows you to select a contest based on the deadline date.

One last note: read the submission guidelines carefully. Some contests allow you to enter the same piece to other sites, while others insist that the story you submit is not in any other contest. When magazines publish the winners, they often have dual submission restrictions.

Some even allow you to submit the same piece in their next contest. Science Fiction Writers of the Future hold a contest every quarter. They allow you to submit the same piece each time. The hope is that you will continue to revise and improve it with each submission.

Remember, the more awards you win, the more accolades you can advertise on your website when you have your book published.

Anthology Title

Echoes of Tradition:
Indigenous Orientation to Community, Time, and Land

Description

In this anthology we explore and contrast the differences between indigenous cultural views of community, land, and time vis-à-vis that of the dominant Western culture. Whether such differences manifest themselves in poetry, prose, or essay - whether you are highlighting the differences or simply embracing one of the Native American concepts - we challenge you to explore the Native American approach to these essential parts of our lives and incorporate them into your writing.

Community

Western society strongly emphasizes the rights of the individual while Native culture affirms the well-being of the whole. A culture steeped in communal living countered by a highly individualistic dominant society, Native culture is, at its core, about community, tribe, and the general good.

Land

To the dominant culture, land is something to be bought, sold, and owned by an individual. The Indigenous perspective views land as a sentient being and as such, could not be owned. If anything, the Earth owns us.

Time

While the majority sees time as a linear concept, Native culture leans into a circular concept, viewing time as cyclical. In a cyclical understanding, events will reoccur and can be revisited. Said differently, there are no definite beginnings or endings, rather only what is, what has always been, and will always be.

Nuts & Bolts for Submission

- Submissions are exclusively for Tulsa NightWriter Members.
- Submissions are open until June 10, 2024.
- A reading fee of \$10 per piece is due at the time of submission.
- All submissions must be in English.
- Writers may submit multiple pieces, but each piece must be submitted in separate files, each accompanied by their own reading fee.
- No graphic sex or violence.
- We are looking for previously unpublished pieces and your submission grants Tulsa NightWriters first publication rights in North America.
- Not all submissions will be accepted for publication.
- We accept simultaneous submissions, but please notify Tulsa NightWriters immediately if the piece is accepted elsewhere so it may be withdrawn from consideration. There will be no refunds for the reading fees.
- Submissions will be blind. The author's name should not appear anywhere on the submitted document or file.
- Use 12-point, Times New Roman, double-spaced, with pages numbered.
- 2,500 word maximum. If submitting poetry, you may submit up to 3 pieces, not to exceed 2,500 words total.
- Cash prizes will be awarded for the top two pieces. \$100 for first prize, \$50 for second.
- All pieces chosen for inclusion in the anthology will receive a copy upon publication.

- Wherever you write, listen to all of the sounds around you and describe them in your piece.
- Book a hotel room or cottage just for yourself. No television, or social media. Just you and your writing medium.
- Attend a local Live Lit night and listen to other authors read pieces of their works in progress.
- Listen to your favorite inspirational music.
- Clean and rearrange your office. A new look to your space may start your creative brain to rewire itself and begin new journeys.
- Focus on writing with your 5 senses instead of your conventional ways.

I have so many other ideas, but these will get us started for now. Good luck and I can't wait to see your creative thoughts coming to life in the near future!

- Accepting announcements for book releases, with links for purchase; these will appear in the newsletter for two months.
- Accepting articles for consideration on writing and publishing-related topics.
- Accepting event announcements for writing and publishing related events.

Deadline

Last Day of the Month prior to publication. Please submit your ad or announcement at least two months before you need it to appear.

Specifications & Submission

Please format your text as follows: Times New Roman, 12 pt single spaced. Attach as a .doc or Pages file. Attach any graphics and/or photographs. Your submission can be emailed to the Editor at editor@tulsanightwriters.org or submitted online [here](#).
