Write What They Can't Put Down

Squirrels invaded my tomatoes recently. The worst part is that they picked my biggest and best tomatoes, ate half, and left the rest to spoil. "If you're going to eat my tomatoes, eat the whole thing," I yelled.

Then I thought about the book I'm writing. After putting weeks of work into writing the book, my biggest fear is that readers won't love it like I do.

What makes a reader pick it up and then put it down half-read? More importantly, how can I write a book the reader won't be able to put down?

1. **Proofread and edit** – Every time I proofread my manuscript, I find more mistakes. My first proofread is with either Grammarly or ProWritingAid. These programs catch most of the spelling and grammar

errors in my work. My second, third, and fourth times proofreading, I look for awkward sentences and weak descriptions.

2. **Read the book out loud** – When I look at my manuscript on a computer screen, my mind will fill in gaps I didn't write. When I read it out loud, I can hear which sentences are awkward and where I left out a word.





3. Look for weaknesses – did I do too much telling and not enough showing? What about point of view (POV)? Did I switch from one character's POV to another character? Did I use clichés? Can I make my descriptions more vivid?

4. **Cut out unnecessary words, sentences, and passages** – Like most writers, I tend to use words like "that" too often. I can also get too wordy or try to include great research I found that has little to do with the plot. Eliminating these passages can be painful, but it keeps the reader in the story. Any detail that takes the reader out of the story is a place where the reader might put down my book.

5. **Use Beta Readers** – The most important method of improving my book is to use Beta readers. A Beta reader is someone who will read your manuscript and critique it. The more people who read and critique your work, the better. After all, they are seeing it like a reader will see it.

6. **Hire a human editor –** The grammar programs are good, but nothing replaces a professional editor. For those who have a publisher, editing is usually one of the services they offer. If you plan on doing your own publishing, it is beneficial to hire a human to edit your work. They can catch things like plot development and internal conflict that a computer program won't.

After polishing my work, it is ready to share with the world. Hopefully, readers won't put down my book half-read like my squirrels put down their tomatoes.

For What It's Worth...

On July 3rd, 1776 John Adams wrote to his wife Abigail:

The second day of July 1776, will be the most memorable epoch in the history of America. I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival ... It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires, and illuminations, from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forward forever more.[9] (Wikipedia)

Fun Fact: July 2nd is my birthday! But that's not why Adams was so excited. Did you know it took two extra days to ratify and sign the Declaration of Independence because Thomas Jefferson got a little too bold in denouncing King George III, and the committee preferred he tone it down a bit? Because of him, we now celebrate the holiday on July 4th.

Another fun fact: if you follow it far enough, John Adams appears in my family tree. Or I appear in his. I guess that all depends on if you list from first to last, visa versa, or most well known to ... well ... me.

History states that, after revisions, the Declaration of Independence was signed by all parties on July 4, 1776, even though some historians believe it wasn't completely signed until August 2nd. Written documentation from several of those who signed claim it happened on July 4th, so we'll just take them at their word.

Fun Fact #3: Thomas Jefferson and John Adams both died on the same day—the 50th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence, July 4, 1826.



My family were wheat harvesters and traveled from Texas to South Dakota harvesting for ourselves and many others who contracted our services. When it was time to head for home, we would always arrive a couple days before my dad and the crew, because dragging those large combines along the highway didn't happen quickly. But Dad always pushed to make sure they made it home on my birthday, or as close to it as they could. Many younger birthdays I fell asleep on the couch waiting for my dad to make it back before midnight, because he'd promised. All of those days I woke up to a giant stack of fireworks on the floor beside me, letting me know he had in fact made it home, and we could now celebrate.

July seems to be a month where the whole country celebrates, whether by floating the river, rodeos, fireworks displays, backyard get togethers, or bonfires. So I'd say John Adams' letter to Abigail was indeed a really great idea that the rest of America has taken to heart.



- Accepting event announcements for writing and publishing related events.


