The Craft of Writing Conference

The Craft of Writing Conference is going to be AWESOME this year!



It will be held at the OSU Center for Poets and Writers in Tulsa on October 19th and 20th (click the link here for more details).

We have amazing speakers, wonderful publishers, and great authors. Come and network with other writers and learn how to improve your writing and marketing skills.

Last year, the conference was so well attended we decided to expand it to two days instead of one. Saturday, October 19th, we will focus on the craft of writing. Sunday, October 20th, we will highlight the business of writing. Both days promise to entertain and educate even the most seasoned author.

Writing Contest - This year, we have added a writing contest for anyone who is registered for the conference. Enter one or all ten categories. All entries will receive a written critique. The winners of each category will also receive a cash prize. See website for details.

Pitch Room – Don't forget to register for the pitch room. There will be four publishers this year who are eager to see what you have written. Roadrunner Press, Admission Press, Fawkes Press, and Roan & Weatherford will be receiving pitches from authors

Saturday afternoon. Once you sign up, you will receive a list of what kind of book each publisher is accepting. Don't worry, nearly all genres are covered. A pitch should introduce you and your book to thhe publisher. You will have five minutes to pitch your

work and receive feedback. That's not a lot of time, so you will need to practice your pitch ahead of time.

Cost – If you have looked at or attended other writing conferences, you will be amazed at how little it costs to attend such a great conference. We wanted to make it possible for writers to attend without straining their budgets. For members and students, the cost is \$55 a day or \$100 for both days. For non-members, it is \$75 a day or \$140 for both days. Since it is only \$25 to become a member, many find this to be the best value.



The cost of the conference also includes lunch!

For What It's Worth...

When I sat down to write my very first intentional piece to be published, I was full of creative, excitement, anxiety, and fear.

I knew why I wanted to write, but why would anyone want to read something I wrote? That was the question that haunted my keystrokes.

As authors, whether we write fiction, fantasy, poetry, romance, or nonfiction, we all have a story we want to share. We want our creations to be weighed and found worthy ... not wanting.



The program I wrote my first book through called it imposter syndrome. Those doubts that haunt authors about the validity of our work. And every author battles it.

I reached out to my professor. "I know my story is profound to me. But so many others have written on finding themselves and overcoming rejection. I'm afraid mine will be a snoozefest in a long line of stories just like it."

He replied, "It might have been told before, Heather, but it's never been told by you. And there are just people out there hardwired to only learn from you and the way you tell a story. So if you quit, you're leaving them without the tools to overcome. Think about that."

Well gosh, when you put it that way ...! It gave me all the confidence in the world to put myself out there and publish.

Today I'm encouraging you to put yourself out there. Maybe you have files and files of written pieces you've never shared before. I'm challenging you to do it.

You could start by entering the contest that's open right now with our Craft of Writing Conference in October. We are taking submissions until August 31st. The details are on our website. Go take a look.

Put yourself out there. Someone hardwired to learn from you is waiting for you to take that step!


